From the Head's Desk

Those parents who drop their children off at school will have seen that construction on the new access road has begun. We have several other projects that we are busy with and the school continues to update and improve its facilities:

The access road should be 100% ready for use at the beginning of the 4th term.

By that time, we plan to erect a concrete fence that runs along the length of the Pre-Primary from the beginning of the Cubs playground until the entrance to the carpark.

A ceiling on the deck area has been installed and the walls will be painted soon.

The old library is undergoing an upgrade with a large world map being placed on the wall and all desks and chairs being upgraded.

Raubex are in the process of levelling the area at the end of our existing field and we look forward to be able to make use of this area soon.

Raubex have been contacted (**AGAIN**) to erect signage along our new road and to paint appropriate road markings on the brick paved road. This is stipulated in the contract and the continued delays in this process are very frustrating!

Future projects include redesigning the parking area to ensure a safe, less dusty and smooth flow of traffic and erecting appropriate signage at both the vehicle and pedestrian access points to the school.

It is unavoidable that during the construction phase of our access road, that parents will be somewhat inconvenienced. Please bear with us and drive extra carefully!

A few years back I listened to a talk given to parents by a lady who was the deputy head of a boy's high school of close to 1500 pupils. She had 4 children of her own and many, many years of teaching experience. She said that regardless of how you parent and the values you instill in your children, at some stage the following were guaranteed:

- Your child will lie to you
- Your child will disappoint you
- Your child will engage in behaviour you have advocated against

That does not mean they are bad children, poorly parented or life-long offenders. It is also not something they have

learned at school. They are just normal children, testing boundaries, taking risks and growing up. You do not have to accept their behaviour and excuse their transgressions, but a severe knee-jerk reaction may end up being more damaging than a more measured response. One action does not define them or set their course for life. It is important that as parents and teachers we use every opportunity to learn, grow and strengthen relationships while modelling the behaviour we expect to see in our children.

A Fantastic End to the Season and Exciting New Beginnings










Grade One trip to the Lurie Farm
