While it is true that every child will be gifted with different talents and character traits, what is undeniable is that innate ability will only get your child so far. To be the best that they can be, to lead a successful life and to make a valuable contribution to society – it is imperative that they have a good work ethic.

A Good Work Ethic includes, being dependable and fulfilling responsibilities and commitments; being punctual (in all areas of your life); completing every task one does thoroughly and accurately; taking ownership and being accountable; seeking opportunities to contribute and not waiting to be instructed; being positive and respecting others; being open to change; always acting honestly end ethically; working to support others and continuously practicing self-reflection in order to improve.

For children to develop a good work ethic, they certainly require input from their parents. It is not something that any school can teach pupils if the parents of the child are not fully committed and contribute consistently by doing the following:-

Modelling Hard Work - children learn by observing and copying their parents. Parents need to be diligent and committed in their own lives.

Age Appropriate Chores - give them responsibilities to help them understand the value of contributing to the household.

Clear expectations – be consistent in what you expect in terms of behaviour, homework, chores and other responsibilities.

Praise effort not results - hard work and persistence is more important than outcome.

Time Management - help to set deadlines and schedules to teach your child how to manage their times.

Problem-Solving - never solve problems for your child, guide them so they work find the solution themselves.

Future Goals - discuss their aspirations and motivate them to work hard towards achieving them

Celebrate Achievements - recognize success regardless of how small it may be.

Volunteer as a Family - this teaches the value of hard work and the importance of helping others.

Extra Work - offer additional tasks that can be done for a reward (not necessarily money). Going the extra mile is beneficial!

As South Africans we are faced with many social and political issues. We have a huge surplus of human capital, but as a nation we tend to demonstrate (by the above definition) a very poor work ethic. No one can be expected to solve our issues – it is up to us! By working hard, displaying honesty and integrity, willingly looking to help others and taking ownership for our problems rather than apportioning blame – we can become a very successful nation. If all parents invest time and effort into their children and teach them the value of a good work ethic, South Africa could be a world leader in one generation.


